In spite of the Covid thing we begin September, the **ninth month** of the year in the modern-day Gregorian **calendar** and its predecessor, the Julian **calendar**. The **month** kept its original **name** from the Roman **calendar** where it **was** the seventh **month**. September means "seven" in Latin. The Romans began their calendar with March that is how September becomes the 'seventh' month.

For many families, September also means the end of summer and the beginning of the school year. Many schools are trying to reopen with students present while still maintaining on-line learning from home or some hybrid model.

Perhaps this is a good time then to look at our own STUDY, the second leg of our Cursillo methodology.

These days offer us both time and a plethora of possibilities to study our faith. The St Augustine Institute's FORUM has so much available for us. Bishop Barron's WORD on FIRE also offers courses on-line. Matter of fact, there is so much available to us, one hardly knows where to begin.

So, as the school year begins develop a plan or curriculum for yourself. Some courses are eight of ten sessions. If you do one a week, that takes care of two months. Maybe pick a Book of the Bible to read and study. Many Bibles have and introduction to the particular Book at the beginning. Perhaps the life of a saint. There are a number of them during the month of September: St Gregory the Great (3rd); the Nativity of Mary (8th) and Her Holy Name (12th); Peter Claver (9th); the Exultation of the Holy Cross (14th and Our Lady of Sorrows (15th); Corneilius and Cyprian (16th); Robert Bellarmine (17th); St Januarius (19th) Matthew the Apostle and Evangelist (21st); Padre Pio (23rd); Cosmos and Damian 26th); St Wenceslaus and St Lawrence Ruiz and Companions (28th); Michael, Gabriel and Raphael -the Archangels(29th). An impressive list to learn about.

Our own **School of Leaders** on <u>Saturday</u>, the 19th of <u>September</u> from 9 am till noon. It is a ZOOM meeting on-line so there is no limit to the number of participants. Come join us again for the first time. One of our studies is the Book <u>His Way</u> by David Knight. It's an oldy but goodie and will good for all of us to (re) - read. His book is about knowing Jesus Christ: a complete but simple plan for making the person of Jesus Christ a living reality in your life, in your family, in the world you live and work in. "if laypersons ever began to bear witness to Christ in everything they do, regardless of the risk, then the Kingdom will really be at hand." Fr Knight.

I leave you with a little prayer from the Christophers.

Dear God, help me to focus on the good in others; to find the positive qualities in my neighbor, my family, my community, my church and even in myself.

Help me to focus more on the good in life and in Your power than on what seems wrong in our world.

Help me to trust that as I focus on the good, I can more easily connect to Your hope and joy, and be inspired with solutions to change things for the better,

Hello, fellow Christians on the journey!

John Lyons wrote of his experience of the Cursillo Encounter held virtually on July 24-25, I would like to share some of my insights and observations as well.

I appreciated that, since it was a Cursillo gathering, we all had lived a Cursillo weekend: there were understandings that we all had. There were goals we all strive to attain. However, there is always much to learn, as we all know. No one on this earth has "arrived": there are always opportunities for new or enhanced comprehension of what our Lord is calling us to do and be.

Father Mark Seiker, National Cursillo Spiritual Advisor, gave the Spiritual Keynote address at the beginning of the Encounter. There is so much wisdom from those who have gone before us in faith. It is important to read what the saints have written. Father Mark mentioned several saints.

The thoughts from the writings of St. Ambrose really struck me:

"Let your door stand open to receive Him, offer Him a welcome in your mind. Throw wide the gate of your heart."

And from St. Augustine encouraging us to fill our "containers" with what is good, releasing what is not good to make room for more of Jesus:

"Suppose you are going to fill some holder or container, and you know you will be given a large amount. Then you set about stretching your sack or wineskin or whatever it is. Why? Because you know the quantity you will have to put in it and your eyes tell you there is not enough room. By stretching it, therefore, you increase the capacity of the sack, and this is how God deals with us. Simply by making us wait he increases our desire, which in turn enlarges the capacity of the soul, making it able to receive what is to be given to us."

And from Thomas à Kempis' Imitation of Christ (which I admit that I have never read, but that is going to change):

"The man who lives without Jesus is the poorest of the poor."

I was able to participate in a breakout session with other attendees from our own Region V as well as from other regions. In our discussion, I heard of a book by Daniel Mueggenborg called "Come Follow Me: Discipleship Reflections on the Sunday Gospel Readings". There is a book for each liturgical year.

Based on the enthusiastic recommendation from a lay director from another region, I bought the book for our current year, Year A. The first week I had it, the reflections provided me with new insights into the Gospel for the Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. This is when Jesus walked on the water, and Peter's attempt to do the same. 3 things I learned from this book were:

- 1. Jesus forced the disciples to go without Him to the other side. I had never noticed that. The explanation goes further. In the midst of their aloneness, the reading tells us that the disciples are literally tortured by the sea and winds (similar to the situation that the early Church faced). That they are in a boat is symbolic since the boat was an early symbol of the Church. Even now, the central portion of a traditional church is called the "nave", a Latin word that means boat.
- 2. It is at the darkest part of the night when the struggle is most difficult for the disciples, the darkest hour of the entire night. It is then that Jesus comes to them. He is with them just as was promised.
- 3. The reflection goes on to say that "Sometimes, the trials we face teach us a lot about ourselves and God. Sometimes we only discover our potential when we have to utilize every resource for our survival."

How true that last point is for us now. I think that I was initially looking at the pandemic restrictions as a necessary, but quite temporary, change in my life and routine. I was motivated to do some organizing (much still needs to be done!), and just accepting this time for what it seemed: a brief blip on the landscape of my life.

As the pandemic continues to limit our activities and interactions, it has been harder for me to get motivated. (Grasping the process of knitting is not going well.) The underlying uncertainty of how life will look in the future, when some sense of "normalcy" (whatever that is) will return, what I'm "supposed" to be learning during this time, all weigh on me. Fortunately, I know that GOD is in control. Everything is His. I am His. All I have and do is His. HE knows how this will all work out. "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose." Romans 8:28

We'd like to finish with a little food for thought; an excerpt from the book "Arise from Darkness" by Fr. Benedict Groeschel. He was a Franciscan friar who frequently appeared on EWTN. The excerpt was written by author, Andrew Armstrong. In my reflection I thought of how perhaps I am too embroiled in all the negativity that is constantly swirling around me at this time. In truth I should be striving to be more aware of the goodness of Jesus and the beauty of His cross. If THAT becomes my focus, the evil I perceive to be swirling around me might go to its' proper place. Away from our world.

"The Parable of the Cross"

"All the people who had ever lived were assembled before the THRONE of God. They were a sullen lot. They all had complaints and they began to murmur amongst themselves. Who does God think He is, anyway?

One of the groups was composed of Jews who had suffered persecution. Some had died in gas chambers and concentrations camps—and they grumbled; how could God know of the suffering they had been through? Another group was slaves – black men and women with brands on their brows, great hosts of them, who had suffered indignities at the hands of those who called themselves "God's people". What could God know about their plight? There were long lines of refugees driven from their lands – homeless people who had nowhere to lay their heads. And there were poor people, who had never on this earth been able to make ends meet. There were sick ones and sufferers of all kinds, hundreds of groups, each with a complaint against God. What could He know about what human beings were forced to endure?

From each group a leader was chosen and a commission appointed to draw up the case against the Almighty Himself. Instead of God judging them, they begin Judging Him. And the verdict was that God should be sentenced to live on earth as a human being with no safeguards to protect His Divinity. And there was a bill of particulars.

Let Him be born a Jew. Let Him be born poor. Let even the legitimacy of His birth be suspect. Give Him hard work to do and poverty that He might know the pinch. Let Him be rejected by His people. Give Him for friends only those who are held in contempt. Let Him be betrayed by one of His friends. Let Him be indicted on false charges, tried before a prejudiced jury, convicted by a cowardly judge. Let Him be abandoned by His friends and see what it is to be terribly alone. Let Him be tortured and then let Him die at the hands of His enemies.

As each group announced its' sentence on God, roars of approval went up from the THRONE. When the last had finished, the raucous noise had become almost deafening ... and then everyone turned toward the THRONE. And suddenly heaven was filled with shocked penitent silence. For where there had been a THRONE, now could only be seen a CROSS."

On October 8, 1871, two great fires occurred in the Midwest. The Great Chicago Fire killed 250 people and left one-quarter of Chicago homeless. The other one, the Great Peshtigo Fire in the forests of Northern Michigan and Wisconsin affected 1.5 million acres and killed approximately fifteen hundred people. Fire can be devastating and fast moving and can unleash terrible power. So, when the writer James compares the tongue to a fire, it makes perfect sense. We have all seen it happen way too often. What seemed to start out as a friendly conversation becomes a major disagreement with hurtful, damaging words and lingering consequences. How often have we seen a simple disagreement smolder ever so slightly and then combust and ignite the situation into an incredible inferno of anger? Our words reflect what is in our hearts.

"As (a man) thinketh in his heart, so is he". Jesus says something similar: "Whatever is in your heart determines what you say".

Be slow to speak, especially when you are angry, or your emotions are racing. it only takes a few inflammatory words to destroy a relationship forever. Put out the fire of angry words before saying them. If someone is angry and screams at you, maintain your cool. Do your best to douse the situation with your silence.

May the fire of the Holy Spirit burn in each of you.
